The world has become smaller in its diversity and almost unquestioned liberal neo-feudal capitalism, and at the same time it has become more conflictual, with more wars than at any time since World War II. In the early 20th century, women demanded workers' rights, equal pay with men, the right to vote, and the right to civil marriage and divorce. They marched for their rights for years until the UN recognized March 8 as International Women's Day in 1977. We want to remember the early women's rights leaders and what they accomplished. We recognize that women's rights have been eroded in the last decade, often in times of severe political, social, environmental, or war crises. In some countries, girls' and women's rights to education and employment, to reproductive rights, to freedom of movement and dress, and to live in safety have been seriously violated in recent years. How could this happen? In the face of all these adversities, the dehumanization of girls and women and the violation of their rights, social work must strengthen transnational solidarity. What are the experiences of transnational solidarity and what is the role of social workers, social work educators in these processes, are topics that we will address in presentations and joint discussions. The solidarity and support network with social work educators, students and practitioners from Ukraine living in war provides a framework for this event.
